Official Policy

The Boy Scouts of America has always been a uniformed body. Its uniforms help to create a sense of belonging. They symbolize character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness. Wearing a uniform gives youth and adult members a sense of identification and commitment.

Personal equality. The uniform represents a democratic idea of equality; bringing people of different racial, economic, religious, national, ethnic, political, and geographical backgrounds together in the Scouting tradition.

Identification. It identifies youth and adults as members of the Boy Scouts of America, visible as a force for good in the community. When properly and smartly worn, the uniform can build good unit spirit. When worn on the correct occasions, it can attract new members.

Achievement. The uniform shows the wearer's activity, responsibility, and achievement. What each youth or adult member has accomplished with program opportunities can be recognized by the insignia worn on the uniform.

Personal commitment. The uniform is a constant reminder to every Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, Explorer, and adult of their commitment to the ideals and purpose of the Boy Scouts of America. It encourages them to take Scouting seriously because of the investment in uniforms by parents of youth and by adults. It is a way of making visible members' commitment to a belief in God, loyalty to country, and to helping others at all times.

The leaders of Scouting—both volunteer and professional—promote the wearing of the correct complete uniform on all suitable occasions.

The Rules and Regulations and policy. The succeeding pages contain our uniform policy as taken from the *Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America*. The following chapters contain applications of the regulations to each program area. Neither the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, the policy, nor the program applications may be added to or changed in any way unless approved by the national Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America through its Program Group Committee.

Excerpts from the Rules and Regulations

NOTE: The name of the Corporation is Boy Scouts of America. For convenience, in the Rules and Regulations, the word "Corporation" is sometimes used instead of the official name.

INSIGNIA, UNIFORMS, AND BADGES

ARTICLE X, SECTION 4.

GENERAL

Clause 1. The badges and other official insignia and the uniforms of the Boy Scouts of America shall be made available to, and used only by, registered youth members or officials

and other members who have satisfactorily complied with the requirements prescribed by the Corporation.

OFFICIAL UNIFORMS

Clause 2. The official uniforms authorized as evidence of official relationship to the Boy Scouts of America shall be those approved by action of the Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America from time to time, as illustrated and correctly described in the handbooks, catalogs, and other official publications of the Boy Scouts of America.

Clause 4. Prohibition of Alteration or Imitation.

(a) No alteration of, or additions to, the official uniforms, as described in the official publications, or the rules and regulations covering the wearing of the uniform and the proper combinations thereof on official occasions, may be authorized by any Scouting official or local council or any local executive board or committee, except the Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America after consideration by the Program Group Committee.

PROTECTION OF UNIFORMS

Clause 3. Restricted Sale and Use. The sale and use of the appropriate uniform as specified shall be restricted to members of the Boy Scouts of America who are registered and in good standing, according to the records of the organization. It shall be the responsibility of all members of the Boy Scouts of America and especially of all commissioned officers and chartered councils to cooperate with the Corporation in preventing the use of the official uniforms by those who are not members of the organization in good standing.

(b) Imitation of United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps uniforms is prohibited, in accordance with the provisions of the organization's Congressional Charter.

DISTRIBUTION OF UNIFORMS

Clause 5. The official uniforms and parts thereof shall be issued only as authorized by the Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America and sold either directly by the national office—

through responsible local merchants designated as local Scouting distributors—or through designated local councils. Local Scouting distributors may be appointed and licensed and the licenses revoked only by the national office, but chartered local councils may make recommendations for such actions.

USE OF UNIFORM

Clause 6. The official uniforms are intended primarily for use in connection with Scouting activities as defined by the national Executive Board, and their use may be approved by the

local council executive board for council events or activities under conditions consistent with the *Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America*.

Clause 7. Use Abroad. Members of the Boy Scouts of America, whose address of registration is within the United States, shall not wear the official uniforms nor any official Scouting badges and insignia outside the limits of the United States except when carrying international letters of introduction issued by the Corporation or as members of groups traveling with tour permits issued by the Corporation.

PROTECTION AND USE OF BADGES AND INSIGNIA

Clause 8. All badges and insignia of the Boy Scouts of America shall be used exclusively by members of the Boy Scouts of America, registered and in good standing according to the records at the national office, who qualify in accordance with the provisions herein set forth or as may be authorized by the Executive Board

from time to time and published in the official handbooks by the Corporation.

Clause 9. All badges and insignia shall remain the property of the Boy Scouts of America subject to recall for cause by the Corporation or its duly authorized representative.

ALTERATION OF BADGES AND INSIGNIA

Clause 10. No alteration of, or additions to, the official badges and insignia or in the rules and regulations governing their use or their location upon the uniform may be authorized by

any Scouting official, local council, local executive board, or committee except the national Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America and committees specifically authorized thereof.

SPECIAL LOCAL BADGES AND INSIGNIA

Clause 11. Local councils are authorized to adopt special badges and insignia as awards for particular purposes in harmony with national policies and to permit their use upon the official

uniform in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Corporation, but such awards must be approved as to purpose and design by the Corporation in advance.

AUTHORIZATION

Clause 12. The national office shall have the sole right to authorize the use of insignia, words, phrases, designation marks, pictorial representation, and descriptive remarks relating to the program of the Corporation on commercial prod-

ucts, promotional efforts, and/or sale and distribution to members of the Boy Scouts of America and/or the general public.

The use of same by local councils shall be only as authorized and approved by the national office.

Special Regulations

AWARDS FROM OTHER SCOUT ASSOCIATIONS

Scouters occasionally receive awards from Scouting associations of other nations, and it is important that they know how these awards should be worn. This does not include jamboree patches. Following are the regulations for wearing such awards:

1. They are always worn when visiting the country whose Scouting association

presented the award or when attending a meeting or function attended by Scouters from that country.

2. Medals awarded by other associations are worn above the left breast pocket.

BADGES OF OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

The general rule is that badges awarded by organizations other than the Boy Scouts of America may not be worn on an official uniform. This includes military medals and service ribbons. There are, however, notable exceptions. Among

them are religious emblems and those special badges approved by local councils in conjunction with the national Program Group Committee such as Historic Trails medals.

BADGE SWAPPING

Boy Scouts and Explorers attending jamborees may swap among themselves articles and novelties of a local or regional nature. The swapping of such items as badges of office, rank, distinguished service, training, performance, achievement, and distinction, however, is a vio-

lation of article X of the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, forbidding the holding of these badges by any but the members who have complied with the requirements for them.

HEADGEAR REGULATIONS

Official headgear may be worn while the unit or individual is participating in an indoor formal ceremony or service duty, except in religious institutions where custom forbids. Typical indoor activities of this type are flag ceremonies, inspections, orderly duty, or ushering service. In any informal indoor activity where no official ceremony is involved, the headgear is removed as when in street clothes. The Scouter dress uniform is always worn without headgear. Pins may

be worn on the jamboree hat but only while at the jamboree and Webelos activity badges may be worn on the Webelos cap (see page 10). As part of the First Class Emphasis, the large standard metal pin, No. 00017, has been reinstated as an option to the cloth First Class rank badge. The large pin also may be worn only by boys on the front of the campaign hat, No. R501. No other pins may be worn on official headgear of the BSA.

COUNCIL SHOULDER PATCHES

A custom-designed multicolor council shoulder emblem is designed for each council and dramatizes local tradition for all members of the

council. In this No. 16000 series, the last three digits of the catalog number represent the council number.

DISTRICT INSIGNIA

Districts are operational arms of the local council. Individuals are not identified as residents of a district, but of the local council and the Boy Scouts of America. For this reason district insignia is not authorized for wear on the

uniform. Where it seems desirable to identify district participation in council activities, district flags or banners may be authorized. They are described in the flag portion of this book.

DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS UNIFORMS

Boy Scouts or Explorers who are members of bands, drill teams, or drum and bugle corps affiliated with a unit or a local council must wear the official uniform for their registration status. For example, they may not wear the Explorer uniform unless they are registered Explorers. The dark green shirt may be worn by older Scouts.

The wearing of special helmets, scarves, gloves, unofficial leggings, and the carrying of

ceremonial guns or swords by members of such organizations using the uniforms of the Boy Scouts of America is in violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America.

The musician badge is the only special insignia that may be worn by the members of these organizations. It is worn on the right sleeve centered just below (1/2 inch) the patrol medallion.

EXCESS INSIGNIA

With the exception of the Cub Scout badges of rank and Arrow Points, members wear only the insignia that show their present status in the movement. **Every effort should be made to keep the uniform neat and uncluttered.** Previously earned badges and insignia—not representing present status—make a fine display on a

BSA red patch vest, a trophy hide or blanket, exhibited in the home of the recipient, or at functions where such a display is invited. Only temporary patches (no badges of rank) may be worn on the back of the merit badge sash. Only one merit badge sash may be worn.

JAMBOREE INSIGNIA

Jamboree emblems for Boy Scouts are worn only by registered jamboree participants and staff and are centered immediately above the Boy Scouts of America strip or, for Explorers, above the right shirt pocket above the Explorer

strip. No more than one jamboree patch may be worn on the shirt.

If the wearer has an interpreter strip above the pocket, merely move the jamboree emblem upward sufficiently to accommodate it.

JACKETS AND THEIR INSIGNIA

Multicolored jackets in nylon, wool, and poplin are available for optional wear by youth members and adult leaders. The proper universal emblem for the branch of Scouting the wearer is engaged in should be worn on the left pocket or, in case of a zippered jacket or the action jacket for Explorers, above the pocket. The Philmont bull emblem is especially designed for the red wool jac-shirt to be sewn on the left shoulder above the pocket. On all jackets the Philmont Scout Ranch, Philmont Training Center, or high-adventure base emblems may be worn centered on the right pocket or in the same relative position if there is no pocket. Explorer posts may wear their post or special-interest emblem on the right sleeve 2 inches below the

shoulder seam or they may elect to wear a 6-inch emblem on the back of the jac-shirt or the action jacket—not both. The Order of the Arrow has adopted the jac-shirt as its official jacket, and members may wear the 6-inch national Order of the Arrow patch centered on the back. The large Philmont, NESAs, jamboree, National Camping School, Scoutmaster Award of Merit, and international participant emblems are approved to be worn on the back of the jacket. Only one such emblem may be worn at a time. The Venture/Varsity letter may be worn on the center of the right side of the red or blaze nylon or poplin jacket. In all cases, the lightweight jacket is an alternate for the jac-shirt, and this insignia may be worn on it in the same way.

BADGES OF RANK ARE FOR BOYS

In Scouting, **the advancement program is intended for boys only.** Scouters should neither seek awards designed for boys nor wear them on the Scouter uniform except for square

knots representing the Arrow of Light Award, Eagle Scout Award, Explorer Achievement Award, Quartermaster, or religious emblems earned as a youth member.

TWO BADGES WITH THE SAME MEANING

Cloth badges and embroidered square knots are representative of metal pin-on awards and are designed for greater convenience of the

wearer. Generally, when a cloth badge is worn, the metal one is not worn.

TEMPORARY INSIGNIA

Temporary insignia are issued for such events as summer camp, camporees, and Scouting shows. Order of the Arrow regional and national meetings and training activities may also provide them. **Only one such patch may be worn at a time.** The patch is worn centered on the right pocket and must not exceed the dimension of the seams of the pocket, nor extend higher than the lowest tip of the pocket flap. It may be either sewn or suspended from under the flap attached to the button. The Progress Toward Ranks or Webelos compass points emblem may be worn by a Cub Scout or

Webelos Scout suspended from the right pocket button in addition to sewn-on temporary insignia.

Female leaders wearing the yellow Cub Scout leader blouse or the tan Webelos den leader blouse may wear one temporary insignia centered above the Boy Scouts of America strip. Women in Boy Scouting place temporary insignia the same as on the men's shirt.

Commissioners and other conducting inspectors should know that temporary insignia are

not required for correct uniforming. They should not deduct points for failure to wear such insignia, but, if worn, they must be worn correctly.

Consider displaying temporary insignia in ways other than on the official uniform. Here are some suggestions:

- Wear it on a BSA red patch vest, campfire robe or blanket, or special neckerchief.
- Display it on a wall plaque, trophy hide, or mounted in a frame.
- Or, make a special neckerchief slide, sectional totem pole, or flagpole insignia for display.

SCOUTING IDENTIFICATION

It is mandatory that all badges worn on BSA uniforms contain identification including **one** of the following:

- Corporate name (Boy Scouts of America)
- Corporate initials (BSA)

- BSA fleur-de-lis (universal with Eagle or plain one-color)
- Big E, Explorer, Exploring

This means that all council-approved Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, and Explorer badges also must bear a BSA identification to protect them, and that these BSA cloth badges must be approved by the national office.

THE NECKERCHIEF

Official neckerchiefs. Official neckerchiefs are triangular in shape. Cub Scout neckerchiefs are gold with blue border for boys working in the *Wolf Cub Scout Book*, light blue with dark blue border for boys working in *The Big Bear Cub Scout Book*. The gold universal Cub Scout emblem is displayed in a central position on the downward corner. Cub Scout leaders may wear the blue and gold Cub Scout leader's neckerchief. Webelos Scouts wear the gold, green, and red plaid neckerchief with the Webelos emblem on the downward corner. A Webelos leader wears a neckerchief similar to the Webelos Scout neckerchief, except that it has gold embroidered edging and is larger.

A special Lone Scout neckerchief, No. 00703, is gold with the black and red printed insignia of the lone Indian. It is worn by both Lone Cub Scout and Lone Boy Scout.

Boy Scout neckerchiefs are optional. The troop decides by vote, and all members abide by the decision. If not worn, then shirt is worn with open collar. Boy Scout and Boy Scout leader neckerchiefs may be worn in a variety of plain colors and contrasting borders. Those available through Supply Division include the embroi-

dered universal Scouting emblem if permanent, or printed if not. Troops choose their own official neckerchief.

Local councils may prescribe the specific official neckerchief to be worn by Boy Scouts and Scouters on a council or district basis.

The neckerchief is worn only with the official uniform and never with T-shirts or civilian clothing. All members of a troop wear the same color.

Special neckerchiefs, the same size as the official ones, may be authorized by local councils. Such neckerchiefs may include identification of the chartered organization. The standard designed neckerchief may be personalized with troop number, city, and state.

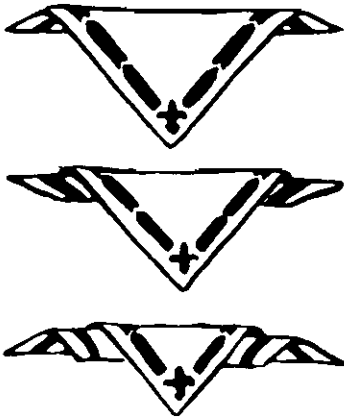

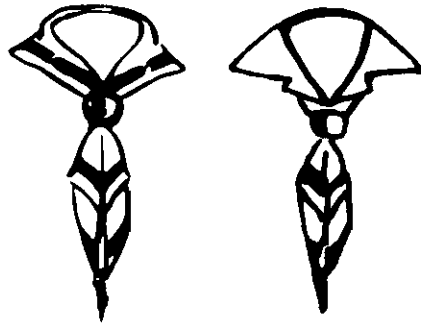

Neckerchief slides. A number of official slides are available from the Supply Division. Boy-made handicraft slides also may be worn.

HOW TO WEAR THE NECKERCHIEF



- a. Fold long edge over several flat folds to about 6 inches from tip of neckerchief. A tight fold prevents gathering around the neck and is more efficient than rolling or twirling.



- b. Place around neck of V-neck shirt. On shirts with collars, the unit has a choice of wearing the neckerchief over the turned under collar or under the open collar. It is not worn over the open collar. The collar should not be buttoned.



- c. Draw neckerchief slide over ends and adjust to fit snugly.



- d. By vote of troop, ends may be left hanging loose or may be tied in a slipknot.

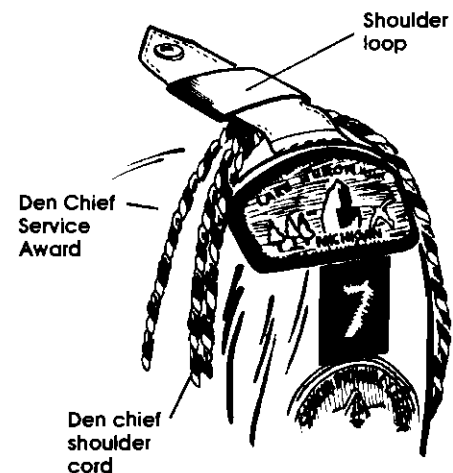
BELTS

Cub Scouts wear the official Cub Scout navy blue web belt with metal buckle and Cub Scout emblem. For Webelos Scouts, the official Cub Scout navy blue web belt with metal buckle and Webelos Scout emblem is preferred for wear with either the blue or the tan Webelos uniform. However, Webelos Scouts also have the option of wearing the olive web belt with the metal Boy Scout buckle.

Boy Scouts wear the official olive web belt with the metal Boy Scout buckle.

Female adult Cub Scout leaders wearing the blue and gold uniform also wear the official Cub Scout navy blue web belt with metal buckle and Cub Scout or Webelos Scout emblem. Adult leaders wearing the tan uniform wear the official olive web belt with the metal Boy Scout buckle.

Leather camp, high adventure base, or Wood Badge belts with official BSA buckles also may be worn with the youth or adult uniform.



Colored shoulder loops identify the area of Scouting: blue, Cub Scouting; red, Boy Scouting; blaze, Varsity Scouting; green, Exploring; silver, council and district; gold, national and regional. Wear the color for the position in which you are functioning.

TIGER CUB UNIFORMS

Tiger Cub T-shirt, polo shirt, etc., with Tiger Cub iron-on emblem,* No. 33928, front of shirt. Shirt color is group option.

Adult partner T-shirt, polo shirt, blouse, pullover, etc., with Tiger Cub iron-on emblem.* No. 33928, upper-left front of garment. Shirt color is group option.

Optional crew-neck orange T-shirt; youth, No. 81591 (small), No. 81592 (medium), No. 81593 (large); adult, No. 81691 (small), No. 81692 (medium), No. 81693 (large), No. 81694 (extra large). May be worn in place of the T-shirt and iron-on. Tiger Cub cap, No. 81792 (youth) and No. 81793 (adult), may be worn with either uniform but is not required.



Tiger tracks, No. 33926 (sheet of 12*), Tiger Cubs, BSA, for participation in group activity, front of shirt in any area not covered by another emblem.

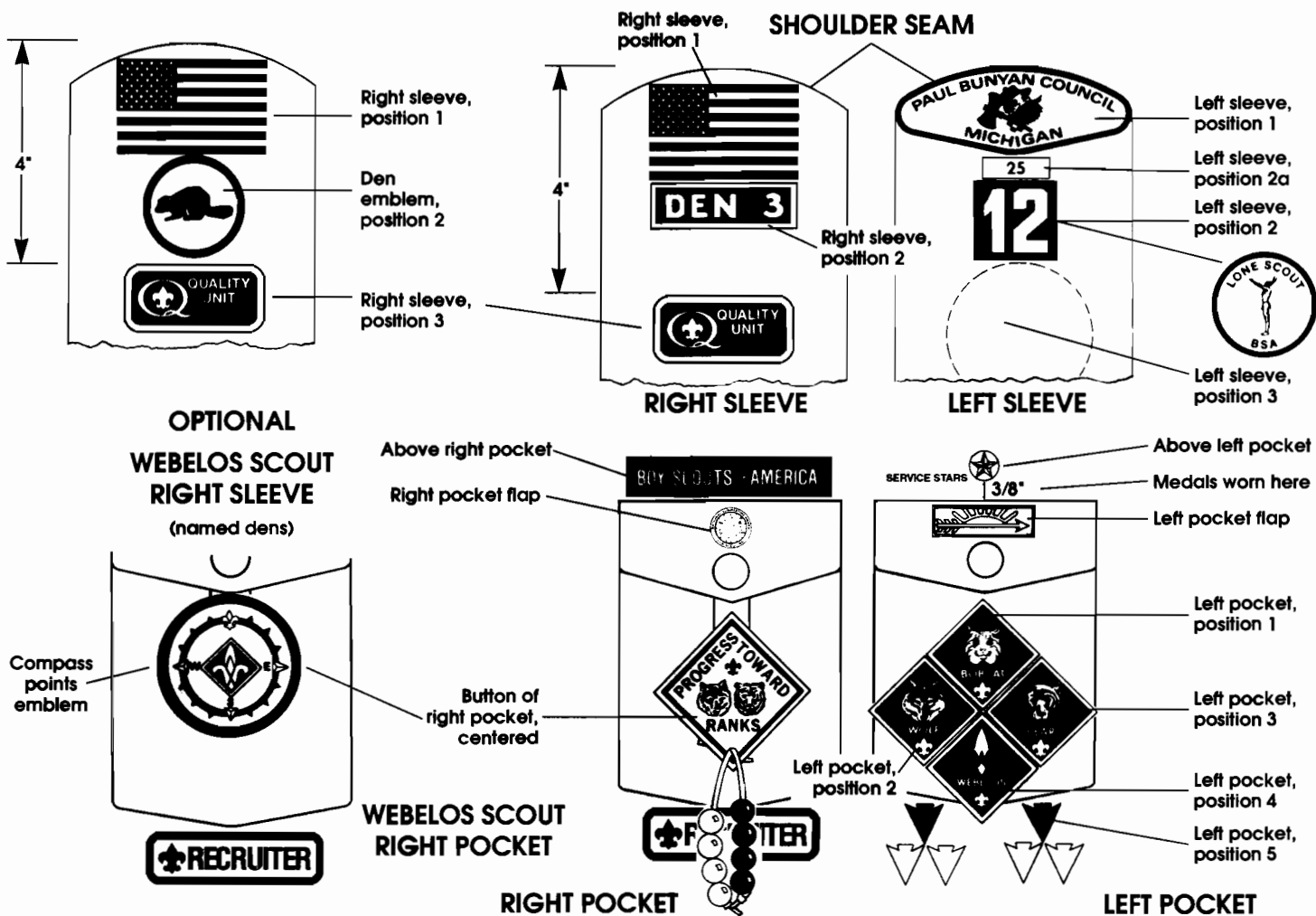

CUB SCOUT PROGRAM IDENTIFICATION

U.S. flag emblem, cloth, red, white, and blue, No. 00103; Cub Scout, Cub Scout leader, right sleeve, position 1. New uniforms have this emblem already sewn in the correct position.

Council shoulder emblem, cloth, No. 16xxx (last three digits, council number), Cub Scout and Cub Scout leader, left sleeve, position 1.

Unit number, cloth, white on red, Nos. 10400 through 10408 (last digit indicates the unit number for 0 through 8); for unit number 9, order No. 10406. Cub Scout and Cub Scout leader, left sleeve, position 2, touching council shoulder emblem if veteran unit bar is not worn. Multiple-digit numbers may be special-ordered—2-digit, No.

10409; 3-digit, No. 10410; 4-digit, No. 10411.

Lone Scout emblem, cloth, red and black on khaki, No. 00352, Cub Scout, left sleeve, position 2.

Veteran unit bars, cloth, Cub Scout and Cub Scout leader, left sleeve, position 2a; 25 years, No. 00133; 50 years, No. 00105; 55 years, No. 00194; 60 years, No. 00195; 65 years, No. 00196; 70 years, No. 00197; 75 years, No. 00107; 80 years, No. 00198.

Den number, gold on blue, Nos. 10701 through 10724 (last two digits indicate the den number); Cub Scout, Webelos Scout, or den leader, right sleeve, position 2, immediately below and touching the U.S. flag.

Only five medals may be worn at a time, pinned in a single row immediately above the seam of the left pocket.

Webelos den emblem, optional (see page 17).

Neckerchief slide, No. 00800; Cub Scout, worn with Cub Scout neckerchiefs.

Neckerchief slide, No. 00891; Webelos Scout, worn with Webelos Scout neckerchief.

Bolo tie, No. 00830; Cub Scout leader, optional wear with open-collar shirt.

Shoulder loops, blue ribbon, No. 00677, Cub Scout leader or Webelos Scout, on shoulder epaulets.

Wolf badge, cloth, red, gold, and gray, No. 00371, Cub Scout, left pocket, position 2. Wolf pin, No. 00030, Cub Scout, civilian wear.

Gold Arrow Point, cloth, No. 00306, Cub Scout, left pocket, position 5.

Silver Arrow Point, cloth, No. 00307, Cub Scout, left pocket, position 5 worn in double rows beneath gold Arrow Point.

Bear badge, cloth, green, gold, and brown, No. 00374, Cub Scout, left pocket, position 3. Bear pin, No. 00031, Cub Scout, civilian wear.

Webelos badge, cloth, blue and gold, No. 00043, Webelos Scout, left pocket, position 4.

Webelos compass points emblem, cloth, No. 00458; device for each four additional activity badges, No. 00459; Webelos Scout, right pocket.

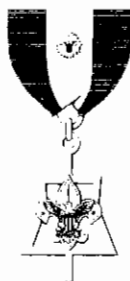


Arrowhead Honor, cloth, No. 00933, commissioner only, left sleeve on long-sleeved shirts. For short-sleeved shirt, the commissioner badge of office may be moved to touch the council shoulder stripe (to accommodate the Arrowhead Honor award). Worn only with a commissioner badge of office.



Trained Leader emblem, No. 00280, is available for all leaders who have completed the basic training program appropriate to their positions. The emblem is worn immediately below and touching the emblem of office for which it was earned. Commissioners wear this emblem between the emblem of office and the Arrowhead Honor. Boy Scout junior leaders who have completed troop junior leader training, den chiefs who have completed the den chief training conference, and elected Explorers who have completed the post officer's seminar may wear the Trained Leader emblem beneath their badge of office.

Note: The Trained Leader emblem may be worn *only* in connection with the emblem of office for which basic training has been completed.



Commissioner Key/District Committee Key, green ribbon with broad white stripe and pendant. No. 00924, above left pocket; embroidered green and white knot, green to right, No. 05006, above left pocket. Commissioner wears commissioner device, No. 00929, on ribbon and/or knot. District committee members wear metal device, No. 00914 (see note on page 45).



World Crest, cloth, No. 00143, Scout leaders, centered horizontally over the left pocket and vertically between the left shoulder seam and the top of the pocket. May be worn by all members as an expression of world brotherhood.



Scouter's Training Award, green ribbon with narrow white stripe, and pendant, No. 00922, above left pocket; embroidered green knot on tan, No. 05008, above left pocket. Trained roundtable staff wears pendant and/or embroidered square knot with Cub Scout or Boy Scout device, depending on staff members' roundtables (see note on page 45).

Nameplate, white letters on black plastic, No. 20100. Worn by all members, worn above BSA strip or above interpreter strip, top edge of left breast pocket on male dress uniform. Worn on right lapel of female dress uniform.

International Youth Exchange, No. ID-214, a temporary patch worn on the right pocket. Available on a restricted basis from the International Division at the national office.

A jamboree emblem is worn above right pocket by a Boy Scout or Scouter who is registered to attend or attended the jamboree as a registered participant or staff member. Only one jamboree emblem (world or national) may be worn.

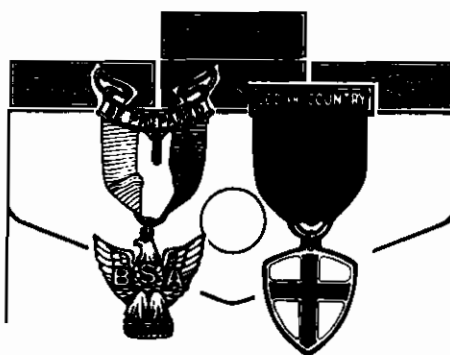
Wearing medals and embroidered knots. Only five medals may be worn at a time pinned in a single row immediately above the seam of the left pocket. Knots are worn above the left pocket in rows of three. The order of wearing of medals and knots is at the discretion of the wearer. It is suggested that the medal or knot deemed most important by the wearer be worn on his or her own right. Embroidered knots are representative of pin-on medals or around-the-neck awards and are designed for greater convenience of the wearer. In the case of the Award of Merit and Professional Training Award, the knot is the only wearable insignia. The knots are listed here in alphabetical order.

Arrow of Light Award, cloth, red and green knot, green to right, No. 05018, Scouter only, above left pocket.

Award of Merit, cloth, silver overhand knot, ends down, No. 05013, district or Exploring Division Scouter, above left pocket.

Cubmaster Award, cloth, blue knot on yellow, No. 05022, Cub Scouter, above left pocket.

Cub Scouter Award, cloth, blue and gold knot on dark blue, No. 05017, Cub Scouter, above left pocket.



Den Leader Award, cloth, gold knot on blue, No. 05016, Cub Scouter, above left pocket.

Den Leader Coach Award, cloth, blue knot on dark blue, No. 05023, Cub Scouter, above left pocket.

Distinguished Commissioner Service Award, cloth, silver knot on red, No. 05019, Scouter, above left pocket. The primary award is a plaque with a metallic medallion: silver for council commissioner and assistants; gold for district commissioners and assistants and roundtable commissioners; and bronze for unit commissioners.

Eagle Award, cloth, red, white, and blue knot on tan, No. 05011, Scouter, above left pocket.

Embroidered knots from other Scout associations, Scouter, above left pocket.

Explorer Achievement Award, cloth, silver knot on red, white, and blue background (red to wearer's right), No. 05526, Explorer or Scouter, above left pocket. This knot also is worn by a Scouter who earned the Explorer Silver Award, Ranger, Air Explorer Ace, or Young American Award while a youth member.

George Meany Award, cloth, blue knot on red and white, restricted, Scouter, above left pocket. Available only from the Relationships Division.

Heroism Award, cloth, red on white twill, No. 05020, member of the Boy Scouts of America who has received this award or its predecessor, the Certificate for Heroism, above left pocket.

Honor Medal, cloth, red knot on tan, No. 05010, member of the Boy Scouts of America, for saving life, above left pocket.

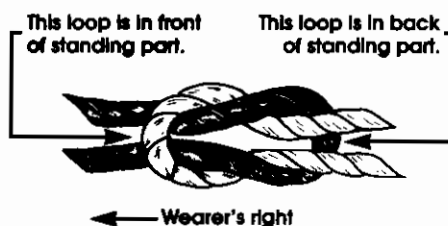
Hornaday Award, cloth, blue, green, and white knot on tan, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, Explorer, or Scouter, above left pocket.

Medal of Merit, cloth, gold and blue on tan, blue to right, No. 05025, member of the Boy Scouts of America for meritorious service, above left pocket.

Order of the Arrow Distinguished Service Award, cloth, white knot on red, No. 05528, Scout or Scouter, above left pocket.

Professional Training Award, cloth, black knot on white, Scouter, above left pocket. Available only from Professional Development Division.

Tiger Cub Group Coach Award, cloth, orange and black knot on orange, No. 17688, Cub Scouter, above left pocket.



Right side up. The loop of the embroidered square knot that comes in *front* of the standing part is always to the wearer's right. In knots where both strands are the same color and therefore difficult to distinguish which strand comes in front, use the above drawing to determine wearer's right. Knots are worn with the distinguishing color (not white) toward the wearer's right. Other knots are worn as pictured on this page.

Quartermaster Award, cloth, navy blue knot on white, No. 05009, Sea Explorer or leader, above left pocket.

***Religious emblem square knot**, cloth, silver knot on purple, No. 05007, youth member or Scouter, above left pocket; cloth, purple knot on silver, No. 05014, Scouter only, above left pocket.

†**Scouter's Key**, cloth, green and white knot on tan, green to right, No. 05006, Scouter, above left pocket.

†**Scouter's Training Award**, cloth, green knot on tan, No. 05008, Scouter, above left pocket.

Scoutmaster Award of Merit, cloth, white knot on tan, No. 05001, Scouter, above left pocket.

Sea Badge, cloth, blue Neptune's spear on silver, No. 05527, Sea Exploring leader, above left pocket.

Silver Antelope Award, cloth, gold and white knot on tan, gold to right, No. 05005, regional Scouter, above left pocket.

Silver Beaver Award, cloth, blue and white knot on tan, blue to right, No. 05003, council Scouter, above left pocket.

Silver Buffalo Award, cloth, red and white knot on tan, red to right, No. 05004, national Scouter, above left pocket.

Silver Fawn Award, discontinued in 1974; wear Silver Beaver knot.

Silver World Award, cloth, red and white stripes, world, two stars to right, No. 05012, international Scouter, above left pocket.

Spurgeon Award, cloth, gold knot on dark green, No. 05021, Explorer leader, above left pocket.

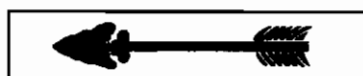
Webelos Den Leader Award, cloth, gold knot on yellow, No. 05024, Cub Scouter, above left pocket.

Whitney M. Young Jr. Award, cloth, black and white knot on tan, No. 05015, Scouter, above left pocket. Available only from Council Services Division.

*The miniature device worn with the youth religious emblem square knot indicates emblem(s) earned as a youth. Wear Cub Scout device, No. 00926, first-level emblem (God and Me, Maccabee) earned as a Tiger Cub or Cub Scout; Webelos Scout device, No. 00932, for second-level emblem (God and Family, Parvuli Dei, Faith in God, Light of the World, Aleph, etc.) earned as a Webelos Scout; Boy Scout device, No. 00927, emblem earned as a Boy Scout; and/or Explorer device, No. 00930, emblem earned as an Explorer or older Boy Scout or Varsity Scout. Only one knot is worn, but any combination of devices may be worn on the same knot.

†The Scouter's Training Award and Scouter's Key may be earned in several program phases. More than one knot of the same kind is not to be worn. Rather, the miniature devices—No. 00926, Cub Scouting; (if earned prior to December 31, 1988) No. 00927, Boy Scouting; No. 00928, Varsity Scouting; No. 00931, Sea Exploring; No. 00929, commissioner or roundtable staff; No. 00914, District Committee Member; and/or No. 00930, Exploring—are worn on the knot to designate the phase(s) of the program in which the award or key was earned.

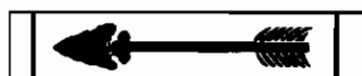

Ordeal sash, No. 02167, and long, No. 02168, Scout or Scouter, worn over right shoulder, under epaulet of tan shirt.

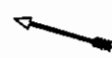

SCOUTER DRESS UNIFORMS



All dress uniforms are worn with a red, white, and blue universal tie. Men's tie, regular, No. 00724; men's tie, long, No. 00725; ladies' scarf, No. 92102; scarf ring, No. 00128.

Detachable emblems are worn on the left pocket (left lapel for women) of the dress uniform to indicate the program phase of the wearer: universal, No. 00355; Cub Scout, No. 00350; Boy Scout, No. 00251; Explorer, No. 04005.

Dress uniforms are worn with white shirts or blouses.

Regional Scouters wear regional insignia on the right sleeve in the second position. This insignia is reserved for regional office holders only, i.e., professionals, committee members, and officers. Exception: adult national and/or world jamboree leaders, but only during these events. This also applies to regional patches designed specifically for a national event.

Flags

The following pages contain information about unit and special flags. For special U.S. flag interpretation consult *Your Flag*, No. 3188, Boy Scouts of America.

The hand-to-forehead salute is correct for flag ceremonies for any person wearing a uniform of the Boy Scouts of America. This includes those wearing the blue blazer dress uniform. The hand-over-heart salute should be used when not in uniform.

SPECIAL FLAG DECORATIONS

Gold stars (memorial). Gold stars may be affixed to the unit flag indicating members of the unit who died in the service of their country. They should be placed along the staff edge of the flag, parallel to the staff, with the bottom star 6 inches from the staff edge and 6 inches from the bottom edge; subsequent stars to be placed proportionately on that line, up to the place assigned to the veteran insignia, No. 11117.

Veteran insignia. Veteran insignia is affixed to unit and local council flags midway between the top and bottom of the flag and midway between the pole and the flag emblem.

Fringes, cords, and tassels. Fringes, Nos. 11035 and 11036, and cords and tassels, No. 11037, may be used on local council, district, and unit flags (but not den or patrol flags) if desired by the persons or committee purchasing them.

SPECIAL FLAGS

Drum and bugle corps. Local councils having a drum and bugle corps made up of boys from different units may put the lettering "Drum and Bugle Corps" in a line at the bottom of their council flag. A unit drum and bugle corps may carry its unit flag but without special designation.

Boy Scouts of America flag. Purple flag with silver emblem.

Regional flag. Purple flag with silver emblem and lettering. Name of state may be added if desired.

Local council flag. Dark blue flag with gold emblem and lettering. Name of council on the upper half, headquarters city and state on the lower half.

District flag. Dark blue flag with gold emblem and lettering. Name or number of district on upper half, name of local council on lower half. Headquarters city and/or state optional.

Unit flags. For size and materials, refer to Flag Order Form, No. 70-421.

Lettering unit flags. The standard format that must be followed does not permit variations in the location of the lettering on the flag.

Top Half of Flag:

- Type of unit (pack, troop, post, or ship)
- Unit number (such as No. 10 or just the numeral 10)
- Chartered organization (if desired)

Lower Half of Flag:

- Location (town, community, school district, etc.)
- State (usually abbreviated)
- Council (if desired)

Explorer units with a unit name may add this to their flag. **No other lettering is permitted.**

Pack flag. Gold and blue.

Junior leader training flag. First line: Junior Leader Training. Second line: [special name of course, if desired]. Third line: [council name].

Council camp flag. Dark blue flag with gold emblem and lettering indicating name of camp and council.

Den flag. Gold on dark blue background, No. 11017. Den numbers are sold in pairs and may be attached on both sides of flag in upper corner farthest from staff; Nos. 11200 to 11209 (last two digits indicate the den number).

Webelos den flag. Light blue and gold on a dark blue background, No. 11114. Den numbers are sold in pairs and may be attached on both sides of flag in upper corner farthest from staff; Nos. 11200 to 11209 (last two digits indicate the den number).



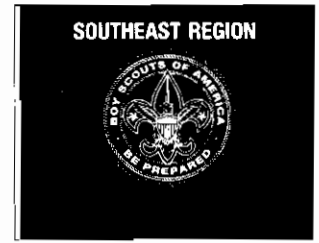

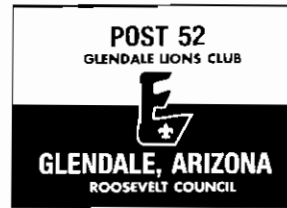
